## **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

ENFIA has concluded another memorable year. We are grateful and appreciative to our partner, the Eldorado National Forest and their staff, to our members and docents, to our managers and the Board of Directors and to the public for their support.

With a 190% snowpack, it was a year of snow, water, wet trails and challenges for the Forest. In the lower elevations Bassi Falls and the Silver Fork/Caples creek area were roaring. Wildflowers began in the upper foothills and swept up the slopes from the lava caps to Wright's Lake and Desolation and then into Meiss and Carson Pass areas lasting into September. Thank you to our field trip leaders for providing interpretive outings in natural history, geology, children's activities, history and Leave No Trace. ENFIA remains committed to providing these educational outings and looks forward to exploring the Crystal Basin area next year. Plans are underway to sponsor a Geology lecture series in the Spring of 2020 that will include a field trip as well. We welcome other suggestions and ideas for the coming summer.

ENFIA, with the guidance of Board member Carl Gwyn, has made a significant investment to upgrade our website and online presence to more effectively communicate with our members and the public.

Plans for the coming year include providing First Nation historical signage at Carson Pass and helping develop a connector trail from Carson Pass/PCT to Woods Lake to avoid walking on Highway 88. ENFIA is also exploring the implementation of a Point of Sale charge system at our retail outlets throughout the Forest.

For Lynne and I, sharing a day at the Information Station with PCT hikers and young families, standing beside Bassi Falls, hiking up to Rockbound Pass in Desolation, watching a full moonrise over Hungalelti Ridge from Shealor Ridge, exploring alpine flowers on Meiss Ridge and having a quiet fall lunch at 4<sup>th</sup> of July Lake continue to inspire us to advocate, educate and help protect our Forest and Wilderness Heritage.

# **RETAIL OUTLETS**

ENFIA successfully operated seasonal retail outlets at Carson Pass, Cleveland Corral, and Crystal Information Stations, and year-round outlets at Amador, Placerville, and Georgetown Ranger Stations, and the Supervisor's Office. This included inventory management, sales, visitor information, and financial accountability.

Wrights Lake Information Station was not operated due to the hectic changeover to concession management at that campground. There is the possibility to work with the concession in the future to provide services for visitors.

With the closure of the Pacific Ranger Station the new Desolation Wilderness Visitor's Center was opened at the Placerville Ranger District. They now have a designated location where you can pick up permits, purchase bear canisters (or rent them), maps, books about the area and health and safety products.

We are making lots of changes to improve our retail outlets and are looking forward to a great season in 2020.



## **CARSON PASS INFORMATION STATION**







### **FOREST WALKERS**

In 2014, the Forest Walker Program was started to increase ENFIA's role along the Highway 50 Corridor. The goal for this new program was "to create a forest wide, year-around volunteer Trail Walker program that provides visitor education, trail monitoring and maintenance on the Eldorado National Forest". The

focus of this group is visitor education and information, trail monitoring, trail condition surveys, light maintenance and visitor safety on forest trails and related areas. The program was mostly on the Placerville Ranger District with a few activities in other areas of the forest. The goal is to expand the program as we develop a group of trained, skilled enthusiastic volunteers.

Typical projects included:

HIGHLIGHTS

• Early Season Trail Checks for conditions and damage. We relayed that information back to the Forest Service. We generally found fallen trees, trail damage, flooded trails, and other conditions needing attention.

- **Trail Monitoring** We hiked the trails talking to people, picked up garbage, and got to know the hiking trails.
- **Public Education and Information** Volunteers contacted visitors at trailheads and on the trail. Members lead multiple natural history excursions.

In **2020**, we are planning to ramp up our efforts to get out on the trails and help visitors and give the Forest information on trail conditions.

## **TEACHER'S GRANTS AWARDED**

ENFIA recently awarded two \$1,250 grants to local teachers, Barbara Simpson at Sierra Ridge Middle School and Krista Potter at El Dorado High. Both teachers offered excellent proposals to enhance their student's awareness of The Eldorado National Forest. Krista will use her grant money to continue to expand the Natural Resource Program at the high school including Fire Science and Barbara plans to replenish equipment for the backpacking program that is offered to middle school girls. We are lucky that Barbara and her husband Steve are also Carson Pass docents.

ENFIA thanks the Carson Pass Station Manager, Dennis Price, who is the author and benefactor of these two awards. His vision will benefit students for years to come.
